Geetings Sisters and Brothers,

Last month I shared with you an article from Alban Institute concerning congregational leadership and their responsibility. This month Alban has offered another article on congregational leadership and after reading it felt it was a follow on and want to share it with you as the Congregation will be electing 5 new members to the Council in January. I hope you find it informative.

Expanding the Leadership Circle - **Patricia Hayes**

Most congregations dramatically underutilize their leadership gifts. Stagnation of the leadership circle is neither healthy nor inevitable, and it does little to encourage the creativity that moves us toward God. Here are some ideas for expanding your leadership circle.

Reflect on the Current Leadership


Begin with the current leaders. Reflection on church leadership is often left to a nominating committee, but there is work that precedes recruitment. Take your current leaders on a one-day prayer retreat built around the following three inquiries.

1. First, ask the leaders to reflect on what serving as a congregational leader has meant to them. Has it changed their lives? Why do they do it? What skills did they come with? What skills did they need? How would being a congregational leader enrich someone else's spiritual journey? How can current leaders share what their service means to them with the congregation and let members of the congregation know what they need from them?
2. Next, consider the leadership circle. Who is included? Who is missing? Look to see how well the genders and various age groups, viewpoints, and ethnicities are represented among the current leadership, as well as length of membership and ways of living one's faith.

Lastly, use your findings to create a plan to expand the leadership circle. Consider, for instance, what avenues the congregation provides for education and enrollment into leadership roles and who is best positioned to do this work or needs to be positioned to do this work.

Make Leadership Visible

Keep in mind that people will not volunteer for what is invisible to them. When church school teachers talk and write about why they find spiritual renewal in a class of second graders, more people sign up to teach. When clergy speak about what is sustaining in ministry, others consider their call. When congregational leaders make visible ways to be engaged in congregational life, people step up to leadership. So take some steps to increase the visibility of the congregation's leadership: Publish testimony in the church's newsletter about what it means to be a congregational leader, and include these testimonials and "how-to-get-involved" information in your newcomer packet. Ask congregational leaders to speak at new member classes, at church dinners, and at other gatherings, and encourage them

A sincere thanks goes out to everyone involved with the planning of Consecration Sunday and all of the Council members for their help with the Celebration Dinner. Our speakers, John Taylor, Virginia Klemens and Patty Cress, were all wonderful and gave their own unique definition of giving because God has blessed us with so many wonderful gifts. The risk you run in repeating a stewardship program two years in a row is that people get tired of the same message. In my opinion, the message of giving back to God what he has so freely and generously given to us is never an old message; it is always timely.

All of the members of Faith Lutheran are to be praised and patted on the back for their participation in this

year's stewardship program. I know that time and talents weren't talked about a lot, but in the coming months during the time we are calling our new pastor and in the time right after we welcome a permanent pastor, your time and talents will become very important. It takes all of us doing whatever we can to keep our church ministries going strong and in the meantime, we appreciate Pastor John's leadership and direction. Out of the possible 83 contributing households on our active list of members, 62 households made a pledge for 2007, amounting to \$171,550. Out of the re-

maining 21 households, 12 households are projected to contribute \$13,957, giving us a grand total of \$185,507 in projected income for 2007. That is an amazing number!!! Thanks to all of you for all of your past and your present contributions to the ministries at Faith Lutheran Church in Jeffersonville, IN.

Please look for statements of contribution after the last Sunday in November and again after the end of 2006. As always, if there is anything on your contribution statement you don't understand or doesn't look right, please do not hesitate to give me a call.

to share the value of their leadership experiences in conversations with other members.

Clarify Your Invitation

Before inviting members to serve as leaders, clarify what it is you are asking of them. Why is this an important activity for them to be involved in? What is the vision or possibility for this leadership task? What will be different if there are excellent people leading? What important change will it make? Keep in mind that potential leaders will respond more positively if you provide them with a clear description of what the job has

been in the past, how much of the leader's time it took, and what the current goals are. They may choose to do it all differently, but without some framework it will be hard for them to say yes to a request to lead.

Support the New Leadership

Once you've found new leaders, take care of them. Provide them with a firm foundation through written guidelines and an orientation session, which provides a chance for leaders to meet one another, get a sense of who might partner on particular projects, and to share their hopes for their ser-

vice. It's also an opportunity to share the goals and focuses of the congregation as a whole.

In your written guidelines, consider covering topics such as how to monitor committee budget expenditures, how to keep the staff and the congregation in the loop, how to manage differences, and how to advertise a program for maximum participation.

Excellent leadership teams do not just happen, but with intention, coaching, support, and gratitude they can soar!

CALL COMMITTEE UPDATE



LIBRARY NEWS

In November I attended a couple of this year’s Festival of Faith’s programs. For several years many faiths have gathered together in Louisville to share their various beliefs and traditions with others. This year’s subject was death and dying. Although certainly not a cheerful topic, it’s one that more people are talking about more openly than before.

The first program I attended was given by the best-selling author, Mitch Albom. Several of you have enjoyed reading *Tuesdays With Morrie* and *The Five People You Meet in Heaven*. He has recently come out with another book titled *For One More Day*. It explores the question of what you would do if you could spend one more day with a lost loved one. Having read the other two, I look forward to reading this one too. A signed copy is available for


checkout in the Library.

The second program was an all day conference called “Saving a Dying Planet: A Call to Action”. I listened to various people talk about the mounting problems of global warming, dwindling energy and available food resources, mountaintop removal, and loss of wildlife. It was alarming to hear Tom Barnes, UK professor and internationally published author, state that even though the United States covers only one fifth of the earth’s surface, we use a third of all the electricity, which is way more than any other country in the world. Much of that electricity comes from cheap coal derived by leveling mountains, leaving behind a virtual desert. I don’t think that was what our Creator had in mind when He created such beautiful landscapes. An author, a poet and a journalist present at the meeting, each told of how their lives were forever

changed after touring some of these affected areas. Carl Pope, head of the Kentucky Sierra Club, summed up the day’s discussion by saying that we now have the knowledge and the know-how to fix these problems. What we lack is the moral vision to do something about them.

This moral vision is where faith comes in. If churches of all faiths would join together to work on solutions, things could change for the better. I couldn’t help but be encouraged as I sat there, watching and listening to representatives of all the major religions: Judaism, Hinduism, Islam, Christianity, and Native American. Each of them spoke of the differences and similarities of their belief systems, but with tremendous respect for others at the same table. What a wondrous thing it would be, if this same thing would happen all around the



world! Would there be something we could do here at Faith?

In the October issue of the Indiana-Kentucky Lutheran is an article about addressing social issues such as these. It recommends the book by Craig Nesson called *Give Us This Day: A Lutheran Proposal for Ending World Hunger*. I plan on purchasing a copy for the Library. If you are interested in reading it, let me know and perhaps we can get a group going for study and discussion.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Sunday school attendance has been holding steady, but we have not had any increase in the children's classes. We have had 5 different children in the youngest class, but never more than 2 or 3 at any one time. There have been 4 children in the k-4th grade group, but again the same thing. They never all get there on the same Sunday so in their eyes it seems as if they are still the only ones in class. It would be so great to find a way to solve this problem. Junior High averages 7 to 9 each week and the high school got as high as 10 students one week. Lyle Gernand is back teaching the No Experience Necessary class for the adults and average 17 or 18 most weeks. I sure wish more of those adults had some younger children!

The Christian Education Committee met in late November to plan an advent event in lieu of a children's program for this year. The choir asked for children to volunteer to help them with the cantata. Since many of the children will be involved in this it has been decided to not try to do another program involving the children in a second program.

We have a problem that we need help to solve. After church or other events at church there has been damage to some of the toys in the pre-school area. Several of the dolls have had their faces destroyed because someone drew mustaches on them with permanent magic marker. We have tried everything anyone has suggested, but nothing seems to remove the marks. We could look

at this as a one time event, but several weeks later the marker was used on a teaching poster and on the children's wreath on the pre-K door. Then on Tuesday, November 14th we found the doll high chair broken, splintered. These toys are used by the Weekday children twice a week, by the Sunday school children on Sundays, and by any child who is waiting for a parent who is in a meeting. These toys belong to all of you, but you would not like it if someone came into your home and did this. You would be upset. We as God's family are upset that it is happening in God's house. We need everyone's help. If you have seen destruction going on please tell them to stop. If you are a parent please check on your child periodically, and explain

to the children that we must share these toys and not destroy them. If your children have been playing in an area that might be affected, please make sure they put the items away before they leave. If we all keep our eyes open, it should put an end to this destruction. Thanks for your help and understanding.

The VBS writers are still at work. We have picked a water theme for next summer's program. There is still room for anyone who wants to help. The next group meeting will be held at 5:30 Wednesday, December 6. Some of the stories will include Noah and his Ark, Jesus choosing his disciples, Jonah and the whale and the creation story. It is shaping up to be a fun and educational week.

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

As the calendar year comes to an end, the church year is just beginning, appropriately enough, with the season of Advent. This time of preparation takes on multiple meanings. Not only are we preparing to celebrate the birth of our savior, but we are also preparing ourselves as a church for the work we plan to undertake in the next calendar year.

You will find enclosed with this newsletter the budget for 2007 proposed by council for adoption by the congregation. The line items were prepared with the input from the various committees. This vote will take place at a meeting at the end of worship on Sunday, December 10. Please plan to attend this meeting. One of the benefits of the stewardship program we have recently completed is that we actually have an estimate of the income to expect in the coming year. I remember *many* years when we planned the budget literally on a wing and a prayer without any real idea of what our income might be. We always manage to make our budget, but the benefit of having actual numbers to work with is two-fold: it obviously allows for better planning, but more importantly, it says to anyone

who may be thinking of becoming a member or any candidate who may be thinking of coming here as our pastor that we are serious about our mission.

There may be a couple of items in the budget that raise a question or two. First, there is a line item to pay child care for the nursery. We have had several families visit with young children who have expressed disappointment that there is someone different in the nursery each week. They are concerned that their children are uncomfortable being left with someone whom they don't know. I have called around to several area churches and found that most are paying a nursery staffer along with a volunteer staffing their nurseries. This item was suggested by the Christian Education committee.

Another item is a new sound system in the worship center. Gordon McCall has done a yeoman's job trying to keep the current one going, but it isn't cooperating well. The system we are recommending comes from a credible source, offers longevity in terms of future use, including additional benefits such as the ability

to record a service and burn it to CD to take to our homebound members and assistance for the hearing impaired. It has the flexibility to allow the use of additional microphones for the choir, soloists, programs that involve the children, etc. There are funds in the Millie Hallman memorial that were to be used for capital improvements which can be used to pay for the system. If you have any questions about the budget before the December 10 meeting, please feel free to talk with me or any council member.

December 17 is the annual Cantata. This year we will add still life portrayals of the stories woven throughout the cantata. Thanks to Arlys Johnson for organizing this and to all those who are participating. Thanks, too, to Barb Brewster and all the choir members for their hard work and dedication to enhance our worship experience.

This year we will hold our regular Sunday morning schedule on Christmas Eve. In addition, we will have a 10 pm Candlelight Service.

We begin 2007 by preparing for our Congregation Annual Meeting, to be held Sunday, January 21, 2007.

The annual reports will be ready for distribution the week before so you can read over them before the meeting. We will act on the proposed bylaws at this meeting, elect five new council members and new church officers.

After reading the article Pastor shared in this issue, I began thinking about the challenge to share what serving as a congregational leader has meant to me. I can't even remember how many times I've served on council, and probably began as a member because no one else wanted to do it! I do know it's been a tremendous growth experience for me. I've called this church home since the mid-1970's and have been blessed to have made many dear friends and to have felt the love and support of my church family through life's peaks and valleys. Serving on council feels like a good way to show gratitude for my blessings by helping care for my Faith family and to do my part to ensure that we continue as a family focused on our mission.
