Akaloo is a family-oriented program, not just limited to one age group or another. FINANCE MATTERS



We're in the beginning of "back to school" days. Administrators, teachers, parents and students are doing those things needed for a productive and enjoyable year.

The prophet Malachi would understand the "back to school" feeling. He called Israel back, not to school, but to God; but there were important truths he wanted them to remember and practice. The truths were not new. The people had forgotten them or put them aside, thinking they were unimportant. Malachi knew they were essential in relating to God.

One of these truths focused on giving. "I the Lord do not change....Return to me, and I will return to you...Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse...Test me in this...and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." (Mal. 3:6-7, 10-11. NIV).

WELCA has been using a series of devotions found in Lutheran Woman Today and the theme for this year has been "Acting Boldly." In the July/August issue, there was a section entitled "The Real Deal." It talked about the ambivalence in

the church concerning setting goals. This article suggested some people feel we are infringing on the work of the Holy Spirit, or maybe we don't want to set goals for fear of being disappointed. If we don't have goals, we set ourselves up for a lack of participation, support and energy in our church family. Not setting goals leads to poor stewardship and we're not clear about what we are trying to achieve.

This article reinforces the attitudes and concepts in the stewardship program we are about to launch. If you remember the process from last year, you will be familiar with what will happen this year. Our Consecration Stewardship Program emphasizes spiritual growth by giving a percentage of income to the Lord's work according to the blessings you have received. Jesus summed up the spiritual connection between money and God this way: "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Luke 12:34) Financial stewardship is treasure management that helps us to es-

cape the trap of selfishness by keeping ourselves spiritually focused on God. We can either become emotionally attached to our money, or we can become emotionally attached to the God who gives us our money. The emphasis of this program is to become the latter.

You will begin to hear in the coming weeks from members of our congregation about the benefits of being good stewards of the blessings we have received from our loving and generous God, including monetary blessings. You will learn how you can help and the decision you make will be between you and the One who loves us unconditionally. Beginning in September: *Hope in God in Times of Suffering*

(excerpted from *Lutheran Woman Today* website)

Christians, like all people, often struggle to make sense of suffering. Beginning with the September 2006 issue of *Lutheran Woman Today* and continuing through May of 2007, Faith and Terence Fretheim explore suffering, a word they claim we use too freely. “We use it to refer to everything from a headache to the holocaust.”

Suffering is a fact of life; nearly everyone suffers at some time, and not all of us suffer equally, the writers posit. Why is that? Suffering can be personal, as in a serious illness or an accident, or it can be communal, such as this nation experienced after Hurricane Katrina or the attacks of September 11.

Our Bible study writers make distinctions among types of suffering, causes of suffering, and the ways we can respond to it. The key question they will explore is, “What will we do with our suffering?”

Each session is filled with information, probing questions, and Bible passages. We hope the sessions will spark reflection, conversation and prayer. Join in the journey as we explore the different realities of suffering, the relationship to God and suffering, and the hope that emerges from suffering.

LIBRARY NEWS

Would you give a stranger your most precious possession? My guess is that you wouldn't and neither would most people. But if you give it some serious thought, you would realize our faith is built on just such a gift. That brings me to the book, *Three Cups of Tea*, written by Greg Mortenson. This true story began with a 1993 mountain climbing adventure that went awry when Mortenson realized he was lost. His life was saved by strangers who gave him tea sweetened by the giver's most precious possession, sugar. While recovering, Mortenson witnessed what the people of that remote village wanted most – a school, so their children could be educated. He vowed to somehow provide it for them, and he did. Not only did he keep his promise, but he continued building school after school throughout Pakistan and Afghanistan, all the while subjecting himself to tremendous danger and personal sacrifice. Because of the dogged determination of one man, nations are being built slowly, peacefully, and with good will toward all people.


Another book I'd like to share with you is called *Night Comes to the Cumber-*

lands. It was written by Harry Caudill in 1963 in an effort to inform and hopefully change what was happening to the land and people of Appalachia. This classic did have an impact on Kentucky history. The problem is that the battle is still being waged today. In his book, Caudill explains how this most beautiful land covered with magnificent, old growth trees, was being destroyed with no concern for the effect it had on its rugged, hard-working people. Coal was and continues to be taken from these mountains, but at a huge cost to its people. It doesn't stop here, either. Just like a pebble in a stream, the consequences affect all of us.

Both of these two books share a couple themes. The first is that one person can make a difference. The second one is the importance of education. Harry Caudill first knew he had to do something when he was invited to speak at an eighth grade graduation ceremony in a coal camp school in 1960. After seeing the awful condition of the school and listening, ironically, to the singing of "America, the Beautiful", he knew he had to do something. That was what started Caudill on his life-long crusade, just as the

precious gift of sugar was what started Mortenson on his.

Neither book is in our church library now, but you can find them in our local libraries. Anyone wanting to read *Two Cups of Tea* is also welcome to borrow my copy.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Sunday Church School will resume Sunday, September 10, at 9:15 am. We will be using new material and have several new teachers. We hope you will be one of the new students if you haven't tried Sunday School for a while.

The pre school classes, ages 3 years, Pre Kindergarten, and Kindergarten, will be taught by Donna Baugh and Edie Maas. These children will be using the new "Witness" curriculum. They will be meeting with these teachers during the Sunday School time. There is also another great opportunity for these children to be together and learn about God's love for them. We are calling it Children's Church. This class will again be taught by Michelle Mitchell and will leave worship together following the Children's Sermon. Using the "Life Together" Series during this time, this material takes the lessons heard in church and adapts them for the little ones to understand. This class is for children age 3 through Kindergarten. It is intended that the older children will be in church with their parents. There is a nursery available for those little ones under three years of age. It would be wonderful if these children could be in both classes each Sunday. They will not repeat material from one to the other and the teachers are different. We really want to thank these

women for offering to teach these special little people.

Grades one through four will be taught by Fammie Peter. She has many years of teaching under her belt and she is looking forward to meeting these young people. They also will be using the new "Witness" material. The first half of the year all students in Sunday School will be hearing stories from the Old Testament. Attendance has been very sporadic with this age group, and the Christian Education Committee would like to ask a commitment from the parents of any children in this age group. Please, please get them to Sunday School on September 10 and September 17. If all of them show up on the same Sundays I am sure they will have a good time and learn a lot. I really hope that by the third Sunday they will be begging you to come to Sunday School. Christian Education and the lessons of Sunday School really is important, folks. The public schools can't and shouldn't be responsible for this part of the children's education. Fammie is a good teacher and we are really trying to make this a meaningful experience for your child. Please help us !!! Thanks, Fammie, for volunteering to help make this happen.

I will be teaching the children in grades 5, 6, and 7 using a series called "Promises of God". It is an older but ex-

cellent series of lessons on the Old Testament. Pastor and I have chosen this for them because this material will dove tail very well with what they will be learning in confirmation class. No, before you ask, the 5th graders will not be in confirmation class on Wednesday evening. But we felt this material to be more age appropriate for them than keeping them with the 1st -4th graders. There is a potential for eleven students in this class. This should make for a really fun group.

The High School group (grades 8-12) will meet with John Taylor. They also will be using the new "Witness" material. Each week they will be working on developing Faith Traits. The first five lessons stress Obedience (people sin)- Forgiveness, (Cain and Able)- Boldness, (Joseph and his brothers)-- Forgiveness, Joseph Forgives his brothers--Obedience again, The ten commandments.

Again we ask that our youth come and give the new material a good chance. Besides where else can you find such great Christian fellowship? Mr. "T" is looking for a huge turnout on Sun. Sept. 10. We know the hour is early, but you can do it for school five days a week. Surely you can do it to learn about God and how he wants you to live the life he has given you one morning a week. See you

Several members who have visited other churches have mentioned the benefit of being able to know each other's names during the passing of the Peace and social times, and we would like to give it a try. Initially, we will put nametags and markers in the pews and ask members

to fill out one color for their nametags and visitors to fill out another color. (I'm trying not to shudder at the thought of markers in the pews with the little people, but I'm sure parents will ensure it will be fine!) If it works well, we'll move to a more permanent solution and provide storage for the nametags from week to week.

We are overdue for a new church directory, but we've been putting that off until our new pastor arrives. Fortunately, our church software program can provide the information and layout and we add the photos, so producing the directory should be easier and less expensive than before.

You'll receive a copy of the proposed bylaws shortly. Most of the changes were outlined in last month's newsletter. Please review them and let council members (Peg Gernand, Scott Wykoff, Kelly Cooke, Craig Warren, Scott Rife, Tami Czerwonka, Bill Holman, Tom Hayes or me) know your thoughts. The congregation will vote on the adoption of these bylaws at our annual meeting in January.

We're thinking of the coming year and the five council members who will need

to be replaced (Peg Gernand, Kelly Cooke, Craig Warren, Scott Wykoff and me). None are eligible for re-election, which represents a big turnover in council. Hopefully, with the adoption of the new bylaws, we can go back to a rotation of three members being replaced each year, which helps the continuity of the council and its tasks. Serving on council isn't difficult, but it does require a commitment to be involved in the activities of the church and know what's going on within the membership. There are wonderful resources available to help lay leaders in their roles on council.

Now is a good time to be thinking about who you would like to lead Faith in its continuing mission. Who do you think would join the remaining members and represent you well on council? Are you called to serve the mission of Faith in that capacity?

It is inspiring to see how we are filled with the spirit to fulfill our mission. Look at all the activities! If there's some mission or activity you would like to see added to what's already offered, let's talk about it!
