PJ'S JOTS

Summer Greetings Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Summer? Well really it seems that summer is just about over. In a few days (or so it seems) many of the local schools will begin their 2007/2008 school year. So I ask where has the summer gone? Like all things, this summer of 2007 is soon to be a memory, and many new and many exciting things will explode before us. I think this is especially true as we think about the church.

In my spare time I do a lot of reading. This summer one of the books I read was: The Honest to God Church: A Pathway to God's Grace, by Doug Bixby. He states:

In the church we talk about having faith and being faithful, but rarely do we talk about experiencing grace and being gracious. Churches are actually at times some of the most ungracious places on this planet, and Christians are at times some of the most ungracious people in our universe. If as Christians we boldly claim to be the recipients of God's grace and mercy, doesn't it make sense for us to respond by being equally gracious and merciful? If grace is the method God chose for ministering to us, shouldn't it be the method we use to minister to one another? If grace is good enough for God, should it not also be good enough for us? How is it that the church, which has been built on the foundation of God's mercy, has become so merciless?

I had to think about this statement for a while after I read it. I found it to be a very harsh statement about church's and church members at first. Then as I read further I began to see why he was saying this.

As Christians we claim to receive God's grace and mercy through Jesus Christ. The time has come for us to show grace and mercy to one another. But how do we change the way our churches function so that our congregations become more gracious?

I do understand what he means. It is not without merit that church's and church members spend more time trying to look at others "sins" and "fallacy's" to the exclusion of our own. He says we spend a lot of time looking at our church's through either an ethic of intolerance of those we judge to be different. Or, we find this pretense of those trying to be perfect to be so lacking that in response some church's will adopt an ethic of tolerance where all are acceptable. Bixby says:

So, on the one hand, an ethic of perfection leads to intolerance, which leaves little room for grace. On the other hand, an ethic of tolerance leaves too much room for ambivalence and, therefore, does not see any need for grace. Tolerance is better than judgment, but love is deeper and more able to transform our lives than either tolerance or judgment. Jesus' ethic of love leaves room not only for grace, but also for graciousness. Grace is the gift of God's forgiveness, acceptance, healing, and transformational power. Graciousness is the gift of respect, forgiveness, and acceptance that we offer each other.

He calls this the "I'm not okay, you're not okay" approach. He says:

This approach embraces an ethic of love and takes the commandment to "love your neighbor as yourself" very seriously. It is an open approach that allows people to be honest about who they are and about their sinfulness and brokenness. It is the means by which congregations can effectively become honest to God churches.

This is what I believe to be the heart of the gospel. And this is the gospel that is the business of the church.

REPORT ON PART OF INKY SYNOD ASSEMBLY 2007

The budget for the synod 2008/2009 of \$ 3,302,446 which is 3.6 % higher than this year's expected actual was passed. They have tried to expect higher benevolence giving to national hoping synod congregations will give more. Several popular programs have been cut back unless income is higher than expected. Some of these are Trinity Seminary, Campus ministry, Outdoor ministry and Global Missions program.

The only resolution brought before the assembly was defeated. It dealt with disapproving actions taken by the New England Synod on allowing their pastors to choose to bless or not same sex unions (which are legal marriages in three states). The INKY proposed resolution was felt to be redundant in as much National had taken similar action in 2005.

There is a new study guide available for Human Sexuality. It deals with such subjects as:

- a) The Christian foundation for deliberation – Galatians
- b) Created as Sexual Beings
- c) Cultural influence and “freedom”
- d) Social institutions
- e) Power and abuse
- f) Money and the bottom line

- g) Economic justice
- h) Facing our responsibility in the freedom of the Gospel

The synod's expectation is that congregations will have used this material to study the issues and make inputs relative to potential ELCA Resolutions by March 2008 so as to be on track for potential actions at national assembly in 2009.

Review of Mother Teresa – A Simple Path

The Simple Path: The fruit of silence is PRAYER. The fruit of prayer is FAITH. The fruit of faith is LOVE. The fruit of love is SERVICE. The fruit of service is PEACE.

PRAYER, FAITH, LOVE, SERVICE, and PEACE are the names of the chapters of this book about Mother Teresa's life of service and love, how she truly followed Jesus' commandment to love your neighbor as yourself. She led an amazingly giving, self-sacrificing life of service.

In PRAYER she notes that Prayer is needed for children and in families, that children need to learn to pray and they need to have their parents pray with them. And if it is difficult to find the words, she provides some beautiful words of prayer in this book (p. 20-21 for family). Another favorite prayer of mine in this book is at the bottom of p. 37, a prayer to be delivered from the desire of, and the fear of.

In FAITH, it is stated that the Church is our family and we need to be able to live together, loving and understanding each other; we are serving Christ. "For Christ,

the Church is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow. To God, everything is simple – God's love for us is greater than all the conflicts, which will pass." Faith is a gift from God, and living a Christian life provides for the growth of faith. In this chapter, I Am On My Way To Heaven, and how heaven is our home ... is very inspirational to me.

In LOVE, the poverty of loneliness and spirituality is discussed. Where there is a hunger for love, there is a hunger for God. A beautiful paragraph is on p. 80. It begins, "God made the world for the delight of human beings – if only we could see His goodness everywhere, His concern for us, His awareness of our needs ..." And the prayer that the Missionaries of Charity say, that ends with "That with the simple faith of a child, I may rely on You." is on p. 82.

It is pointed out (p. 87) that "Love has no meaning if it isn't shared. You have to love without expectation, to do something for love itself, not for what you may receive. If you expect something in return, then it isn't love, because true love is loving without conditions and expectations."

Also, in LOVE, the Warmth Of Our Hand: "Love is not patronizing and charity isn't about pity, it is about love. Charity and love are the same – with charity you give love, so don't just give money but

reach out your hand instead." One time when Mother Teresa held the hand of a homeless man he said, "It's been a long time since I felt the warmth of a human hand."

And in Loving Until It Hurts: Do ordinary things with extraordinary love.

In SERVICE, Mother Teresa points out what Jesus did in His life on earth, the three years He spent healing the sick and the lepers, children and other people. Of her and her missionaries' work she says, "We feel what we are doing is just a drop in the ocean, but that ocean would be less without that drop." There is a section entitled "There Is So Much Work To Do", and "Love In Action" where volunteers share their stories of service and the effects on their lives.

In The Fruit of Service is PEACE, "Whenever you share love with others, you'll notice the peace that comes to you and to them. When there is peace, there is God – that is now God touches our lives and shows His love for us by pouring peace and joy into our hearts." A beautiful prayer for peace is found on p. 171. And at the end, the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi:

Lord, make me a channel of Thy peace, that

Where there is hatred, I may bring love;

That where there is wrong, I may bring the spirit of forgiveness;

That where there is discord, I may bring truth;

That where there is doubt, I may bring faith;

That where there is despair, I may bring hope;

That where there are shadows, I may bring light;

That where there is sadness, I may bring joy.

Lord, grant that I may seek rather to comfort than to be comforted,

To understand than to be understood;

To love than to be loved,

For it is by forgetting self that one finds;

It is by forgiving that one is forgiven;

It is by dying that one awakens to eternal life.

This book reminds us of the insignificance of materialism, and of all we have to give.

Check out this book in our Faith church library. I hope you enjoy it as much as I have. It is one I will check out more than once (in fact, I already have).

WEEKDAY CHURCH SCHOOL

Weekday Church School will begin on Sept 11th. This will be the beginning of our 24th year of bringing the message of God's love to around 50 children in Jeffersonville IN.

As of this writing we have three full classes. There are two classes of first year students whose age puts them two years before they begin kindergarten. Each Class has 12 students and 2 teachers each. The younger three year olds will be led by Debbie Lake and Toni Hedrick. The older three/four's will be led by Charlotte Davis and Edie Mass. Charlotte also has 24 years of teaching here at Faith and Edie probably has around 15 yrs. Debbie and Toni are starting their second year as a first year team. Both have taught in the pre-k program before moving on to run their own class. These classes meet every Tues. and Thurs. morning at 9:30 to 12 noon from Sept to May. In the first year curriculum, the children learn that God planned for them to live in families, that God loves them, and that God made His spring, sum-

mer, fall, and winter world for them to enjoy and take care of for Him. They will learn about Baby Jesus in December and about Jesus resurrection during the Easter season. To this Bible based curriculum, we will add listening skills and following directions when they are given to a group of children. They will work on learning to share toys, a teacher's time, and school supplies. There will be work on learning to count, and saying the ABC's. They will learn to work from left to right in preparation for learning to read. They also will learn the meaning of top, middle, bottom, over and under, first and last. Most of all we hope they will understand that God loves them.

The pre-K class of 28 students is also full. There are also 8 children on a waiting list hoping for a chance to come to school. If we had the space, we could easily have two classes of 20 students each in this program. These children meet every Tuesday and Thursday morning 9:15 to

12:15 pm. In the second year curriculum, we also base our studies on the Bible. There are many Bible stories, and a study of God's gift, Jesus. He is the first Christmas gift ever given. There is also a study of Jesus death and resurrection during the Lenten/Easter season. These children also look at God's spring, summer, fall, and winter world. We have a study of how God provides food at Thanksgiving time and the children help to make vegetable soup. In January we do a detailed study of how Jesus grows up to be a boy, teen, and adult. We talk about how this is also God's plan for their life. During Lent the unit Happy or Sad God Loves you is a time to learn about forgiveness and forgiving others, and that it is normal to feel angry, sad, and afraid. They roll play acceptable behavior while feeling these emotions. To this we add a study of shapes, counting, and recognizing numbers to at least 25. The sounds of the alphabet's letters are taught. All of the children will be able to give the beginning sound



in a word, and many will be able to blend consonants and vowels to make and read simple words by the end of the year. As of this writing the pre-k staff is incomplete. The following persons plan to return. Carol Taylor, Barbara Brewster, Terri Barr, Demarris Scott, Edith Woodward, Monica Hawkins, and Ann Steaban, We will need new volunteers in the skills class as a helper, and both a leader and a helper in the recreation class. If anyone is interested in helping in this ministry, please talk to Carol Taylor 228-1329. All of the teaching staff volunteers their time. No salaries are paid. That is why the donation for this program is \$75.00 a year. This covers the cost of supplies, office help, and insurance. We go on our way rejoicing as we begin our 24th year of service.

Synod assembly Report

Pastor Duran set his theme for his three addresses by using the ELCA theme “Sent by God’s Grace for the Sake of the World”. He started his talk by telling us that his ideas for the development of new churches also work for the redevelopment of existing churches.

He began his talk by asking us, “What is God Up to, how have we seen God active in the world in the last 24 hours?” He then added, “God is going to do what God is going to do. Either you are on his boat or you are not.” To be on the boat, we, as God’s community, the church, need to be willing to change in order to be an active part of God’s work.

To do this we:

Need to have an attitude of prayer asking God to show us his plan for our community. This includes both our church congregation and the people in our part of the country.

Need to be ready to discover a new mission—Duran said, “God is going to do what he plans to do”. We need to ask, “How can we be the church in this place?” A congregation that has its focus on themselves is not likely to grow. A congregation who reaches out to be Christ in their community will be a congregation who has success. As a national church it is said by people who need help, “We go to the ELCA for help with our needs, but to the evangelicals for Christ.” As a church, Lutherans are not known for spreading the knowledge of the word of God and His love for us. We are known for being there in time of need. Our Lutheran World Relief programs are known and respected world wide. We need to discover a new mission.

Need to be a healthy congregation. To be healthy means we have to have the capacity to act for God and to grow in His mission.

Need to have a missional-evangelical orientation. We have been called in baptism to be part of God’s team in the world in which we live. Lutherans on the average invite someone to church once in every 22 years. This is progress. It used to be once every 29 years. The old days of immigration and first generation Lutherans are over. People will no longer come in through our doors just because there is a sign that says Lutheran church. We have to get out of our houses (both private and our local house of worship) and be useful-called to God’s mission, sent by God’s grace for the sake of the world.

5. Need to provide freedom to our younger members. People and youth have the right to choose their church and religion. They will explore other choices. We need to have them see and do liturgy so that they can make an informed choice- choose liturgical worship and then in turn pass it on to the next generation. Letting them choose to come or stay home on a Sunday morning doesn’t give them a basis for choice. Where are our young people this morning”, he asked

Pastor Duran closed with “This is our challenge. Can we meet it?” I ask, “Can we at Faith Lutheran in Jeffersonville, IN meet this challenge? Can we find our mission at this time in this place? Yes!! By the help of God.
