PJ'S JOTS

PASTOR JOHN HAWKINS

Greetings on this beginning of the second month of 2007, February. I want to focus this month's Jots on some aspects of worship. I was reading an article recently excerpted from The Work of the People: What We Do in Worship and Why, printed by Alban Institute. The authors have three very interesting steps that we should do in preparation for worship. They are: *slowing down, making a transition, and warming up.*

The *slowing down* as I read the article entails what we do on our way to worship. Our attitude about the Sunday morning worship begins before we ever leave the house. If our Sunday morning is cluttered with rushing around and barely arriving in time for worship, this will prevent us from making a transition, warming up, and entering worship well. All people that gather for worship need time to prepare. All of us can benefit from slowing the pace of our Sunday morning down as part of or preparation for worship.

Secondly, we have to make a *transition*. We must recognize that worship is not separate from our daily lives, that it is a special event within the patterns of life. We move from self-directed, outward-focused activity to a time of structured and active listening and openness to God's presence and guidance. The authors say: "As a special event, worship is *liminal*: it names and addresses the "limits" of our lives, where the edges of our ordinary lives meet the limitless reality of God." Because worship can do this we may experience many and varied emotions during worship. The range is limitless. Hymns and prayers may touch our sadness, certain readings or parts of the sermon may make us angry as they open us up to self examination and expose the way we have been harmed or wounded. Or, we may experience moments of great joy as we hear the gospel and know it is reaching people and letting them know about God's love.

In this transition we depart from the routine of our daily lives and enter a different pattern. The more attention we give to making this transition, the more natural it becomes. Our daily lives and our worship life are flowing into one another: we are bringing into our lives what we do on Sunday mornings, and what we do on Sunday mornings affects and drives what we do during the week. Moving from being alone or with a small circle of loved ones to being with our family of faith and greeting one another as we enter the church building completes our transition from every day to special day and begins our warm-up, getting us ready to worship.

Thirdly, is our *warm up*. This begins as we approach our worship center. We greet one another in the Narthex or we attend educational events or choir rehearsal before worship. All of us are worship participants and need to warm up.

At the appropriate time, we make our way to the worship center. We get what we need for worship; our name tag, a bulletin, children may grab one of the children's bags with crayons and such. We try to make sure that all the things we need for worship

are easily accessible for the appropriate time in worship. The opening of worship, whether it is an instrumental prelude, a time of silence, or a time of chanting or singing, gives us time to complete our warm-up and ready ourselves to participate fully.

These are just three steps we participate in before worship actually begins. I think they are a good reminder for us and things we need to practice when each of us come to our worship.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

The Faith family did not disappoint in their stewardship for 2006. The commitment that was made during the Consecration Stewardship drive held in October of 2005 was kept, giving was consistently good all year, allowing us to meet all of our budgeted mission items as well as some beyond the budget. God is indeed Good! Not only is our Faith family faithful in their weekly/monthly contributions, they are also faithful to Faith's commitment to the community in the form of designated giving. This year, over \$7,200 was given in memorials and designated for special projects; there was \$3,206 given to CLM and Pastor's Discretionary fund; and there were several other projects sponsored by the youth that were supported with your monetary contributions. This does not in-

clude the amount in benevolence given to the ELCA Synod each year to support world-wide efforts and the additional contributions to Noah's Ark and CLM as stated in our annual budget. Truly, Faith members have contributed to the needs of others as they have been blessed!

The recording of individual contributions is now assisted by our Revelations software program, which allows us easier reporting, both for our own information and to you.

Beginning in 2007 another new program will be available to anyone who would like to take

advantage of it – it's called "Simply Giving." This program is possible through Thrivent and allows our members to have their promised contribution electronically deposited into Faith's operating account. You can choose if you want to make your contribution weekly, semi-weekly or monthly. This type of arrangement is not for everyone, but if you want one less check to write each week/month, or if you don't want to worry about making sure your weekly contribution gets to Faith even if you're gone, this is something to take a look at. Forms are available in the church office.

Lesson Outline


What does it mean to be a Christian?

Their lives and life in our community are improved. There is an after care program that increases the chances of the women maintaining their sobriety.

Call me and share your thoughts, because this sure isn't working in the present format. Even the class that meets during church is down to only one child and she is the teacher's child. We surely need God's help in this area. Please every one keeps these younger children in your prayers and ask for His guidance in helping to solve this problem.

The Middle, High School, and Adult class are alive and well. Each group has

many people around the table for a good discussion group. The middle schoolers are still working their way through the Old Testament stories and its history. It is amazing how often what we have discussed in class matches Pastor's sermon. No, we are not working together to make this happen. When they hear the message in the class first it makes the sermon that much more meaning full to them. Senior high has moved into the New Testament and Lyle's class is on social and church doctrine discussions.

CONGREGATION MEETING MINUTES

JANUARY 21, 2007

Call to Order: President Marsha Woods called the meeting to order at 12:22 pm.

Roll Call: 58 confirmed members were present for this meeting, representing a quorum.

Devotions for the Congregational Annual Meeting were read corporately.

Minutes for the 2006 Annual Meeting were moved for approval by Bill Holman and seconded by Tom Hayes. Motion passed.

The minutes for the 2007 Budget Meeting were included in the annual report for reference purposes.

Election of New Officers: There were five individuals nominated to serve two year terms on Council:

Rick Barr, Mike Baugh, Molly Hegenbarth, Patti Smith, Don Walker. Chuck Landis was nominated from the floor and accepted the nomination.

After nominations were closed candidate Mike Baugh withdrew his name from the elections. Carol Taylor motioned to accept the nominated candidates minus Mike Baugh, Gordon McCall seconded: Motion passed. The newly elected Council members retired to Pastor's office to elect officers.

Faith's proposed bylaws were reviewed. Some of the changes included:

Annual Meetings will be held on the Fourth Sunday of January

20% of voting members would constitute a quorum.

Two year terms will be held by council members with no more than three consecutive terms being allowed.

Council may be allowed to contract up to \$2000 on non budgeted items.

Committees have been revised and will be referred to as "teams".

Council Members will not be eligible for the Call Committee and visa versa.

Virginia Klemens moved to accept the proposed bylaws, Meredith Riekhof seconded. Motion passed.

Financial Report: Faith was current on benevolence with Synod, and we fulfilled our financial commitments to Noah's Ark, and Personal Counseling Service. Once again Faith had a successful Stewardship program culminating with Consecration Sunday.

Carol Taylor talked about hiring a Nursery Assistant. Candidates would have to pass a background check and these individuals would be interviewed by the Christian Education Team before approval by Council. No candidates so far.

Property Committee reported that work on the new audio system had begun and that will begin looking into a new HVAC system.

Social Committee: The OWLS group is having fun and being very active with fellowship, fun, and service projects. Virginia Klemens highlighted some upcoming activities.

Youth: The youth officers were introduced. Virginia Klemens welcomed the exchange students that are staying with host families. Each told about a little about their homes and how their stay was going here.

WELCA: Welca still consists of two groups: a morning Bible study meeting on the second Monday of the month and an evening study which meets on the third Tuesday of the month.

Dick Klemens reported on the Call Committee and gave a quick review on how the committee receives candidate names.

The newly elected council presented its slate of officers for approval.

Charlotte Davis for her years of service with preschool, the library and choir. Marsha Woods then recognized Scott Wykoff, Craig Warren, Peg Gernand, and Kelly Cooke for their service on council. Pastor John then recognized Marsha Woods for her leadership of the congregation during this time of change.

Anne Steaban moved that the meeting adjourn, Bill Holman seconded. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 1:30 pm
