Blessing to you this Lent! It seems odd to write about Lent now as we are already a couple of weeks into this penitential season of the Church. What I would like to do is first to share with you some thoughts about the Lent Discipline that were shared with the pastors of the IN/KY Synod several years ago by Pastor Tom Wietzel. I have found them to be for me over the years a calling back to understand what The Lenten Discipline means for my

life.

The Lenten Discipline by Pastor Thomas Weitzel

On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, we are invited "to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor" by exercising the Discipline of Lent: repentance, fasting, prayer and works of love. These become the specific occasions and opportunities for spiritual renewal during this season of renewal.

Living out a discipline takes our lord's words about self-denial seriously (Matt. 16:24). Through discipline, we find freedom and grace, just as parental discipline is loving and brings a child to freedom and righteousness (Heb. 12:2-13).

In the Lenten Discipline, we focus our lives on Christ's self-sacrificing passion, death and resurrection which has brought acceptance, forgiveness and redemption by God. Through that same discipline, we make a loving response to God.

I think we are reminded here of our pilgrimage from Ash Wednesday to Holy Week and how we are able to use that for a time of reflection and repentance in our lives.

During the Weeks of Lent our pilgrimage will be lead by our mid-week gathering times each Wednesday evening. Our topic for this mid-week journey is a series entitled **Christ on Trial**. I invite you to come and share in this drama as it unfolds leading up to Holy Week and Easter.

Elsewhere in the newsletter you will find information that is important for the rest of the life of our Ministry here at Faith. I commend to you the reading of the minutes of the council meetings that are printed here every month. This month there are several items of particular interest. I only intend to highlight one thing from the Council Minutes. On Sunday, March 4th following worship the Council is inviting the congregation to share in a pitch-in dinner and Ministry Team Fair. This will be an opportunity for everyone to find out what the Ministry Teams are about, who are the Team Leaders and the Council Liaisons. It will also be an opportunity for you to see what team might be an area of interest to you that you would want to be a part of

In Dean Piper's *Stewardship as a Year Round Life Long Journey*, he states "Stewardship is not a program, not a fall campaign for the budget, not a one-shot learning experience." Stewardship is "everything I do after I say I believe." Congregations have long equated stewardship with only money. It does begin there, but it must continue on.

The definition of Stewardship is the conducting, supervising, or managing of something; *especially*: the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care.

When I said yes to being on the Council it was an extension of my pledge to the church. What I could give financially to the church was limited, but there were other gifts entrusted to my care that I could share with my new church family. As

WEEKDAY CHURCH SCHOOL

CAROL TAYLOR



Weekday held its annual registration on February 1st as usual. As of February 14th, the Pre-K class has 30 potential students with 8 more on the waiting list for the class that begins September 11th. There are 21 children ready to start the first year class next September. We try to keep each first year class to a maximum of 12 students, so there are 3 open places in the first year enrollment as of this writing. We are not taking any more Pre-K names because there is no chance of getting a place in that class. Anyone interested in enrolling a first year student should call Carol Taylor at 228-1329 to check to see if there are still any available openings.

Weekday will not meet March 27 or March 29. This is the week of spring break in Clark County.

When we get back from break we will have a lesson on what to taste and what not to put in our mouth. Both classes will discuss the fact that some things could make them very sick and that they should not touch them. This is a lesson on poison control that is very necessary for these inquisitive children.

The Pre-K classes will be working on a unit called "Friendly Ways for Fours". We will be talking about ways to be a friend. We will read the Bible stories about Dorcus and learn how she helped a young boy by making a new robe for him. We will listen to the story of the Good Samaritan and how he stopped to help someone who was hurt. After each of these stories we will relate the idea of being helpful to what a 4/5 yr.-

old can do. We also discuss ways to share toys and ideas on one day and learning to say "I am sorry" when they hurt someone's things or feelings by role playing different scenarios.

The first year class will be talking about "God plans for us to live in families". They will talk about working together to help get the chores finished. They will also bring in family pictures and see that some families have two people and some could have six or eight members. A lot of discussion goes into the fact that God planned that they would have a family to help them grow and learn. The family also provides good food and clothing just like God planned it should be.

LIBRARY NEWS

One of my favorite children's authors is Shel Silverstein. Elementary school children everywhere know him by his poetry books, *Where the Sidewalk Ends* and *A Light in the Attic*. The text and simple line drawings are outrageously silly. Children find his humor irresistible. What I find just as appealing is the fact that many of his books can be appreciated by adults as well as by children. That's because somewhere beneath all that silliness, lies a hidden message.

The Giving Tree is a picture book about the life of a boy and a tree. Throughout all the stages of his life, the boy asks the tree for something he wants or needs. The tree responds by freely giving it to him, no matter what the cost. I see it as a simple tale of God's unconditional love. He loves us just as we are, no matter who we are or what we've done. I also see the tree as a symbol of Jesus who sacrificed himself for us even though we aren't wor-

thy, just like the little boy in the story.

Lafcadio: The Lion Who Shot Back is another of Silverstein's books. It isn't as well known as the others but happens to be my personal favorite and most enjoyable when read out loud. At a third or fourth grade reading level, it's the story of a lion that becomes more like a man. At first, Lafcadio is hunted by hunters only to later become the hunter. Somewhere in between, children are delighted by tales of him wearing a marshmallow suit that melts when ironed (he's a clothes lion, of course) and by his joy of going up and down elevators just for the fun of it. In the end, he had a question to answer, the same question each one of us needs to ask ourselves. That question is, "Who am I, really, and where am I going?" What does Lafcadio do? I won't answer that for you. Instead, I encourage you to read *Lafcadio* to a small child. Hopefully, you'll both enjoy it and find it just as insightful as I did the first time I read it to my chil-

dren a long time ago.

We have both of these books in our church library.

ABOUT THE BLISS HOUSE

The Bliss House was opened by the Center of Lay Ministries in 2001 as a unique residential program for women who are in recovery from alcohol and substance addiction. Based on a 12-Step Program, the women learn how central faith is in dealing with addiction, and also in living their lives every day. In this program opportunities are provided for women to obtain sobriety, learn how to stay sober, and re-enter family life to be positive mothers for their children, wives for their husbands, and children to their parents. In addition, as part of

the program the women become employed, contributing members of the community. Their lives and life in our community are improved. There is an after care program that increases the chances of the women maintaining their sobriety.

The annual fundraiser for this organization is the Annual Evening of Bliss, Blossoms, and Butterflies Dinner and Auction. This year's event will be held at the 300 Spring facility located at 300 Spring Street in downtown Jeffersonville, starting at 6 pm. Tickets are \$60 per person.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

CAROL TAYLOR

The Christian Education committee has two sub committees working at the present time. The first one is the group of people who are writing the material for next summer's Vacation Bible School that will be held July 16 -20 from 9:00am to 12:00 noon. All of the stories will have something to do with God and water. We are calling the series of lessons God's Water Wonders. The purpose of this series is to help the children grow to know God as our creator and savior, and to help them learn to share His love. The material has been written for each age level by Nancy Falkenstein-fifth and sixth grade, Virginia Klemens -third and fourth grade, Arlys Johnson-first and second grade, and Carol Taylor- pre-school. The next step is to present these lesson plans to all of the activity teachers so that they in turn can write their plans for art, music, science, recreation and snacks. This will be done at the next meeting 7:00 pm on March 13. We hope all of these people involved in this summers VBS will make every effort to attend this meeting so that we can share ideas for putting together the five days of activities for the children. The meeting in April will look at the finished product to be handed to the people who will volunteer to teach this summer. We welcome all ideas and people who would take the time to help with this project.

The second sub committee has been working on hiring a permanent nursery attendant for Sunday mornings. We are looking for someone who:

- ◆ Will care for children ages 0-3yrs. From 9:00 to 10:30
- ◆ Care for children ages 0 through kindergarten during church time. Yes, Children's church will still be held for children younger than first grade during the church hour, but visitors may not want their child in a class, but just for us to provide nursery care. This way both class and babysitting can be provided to young parents.
- ◆ If there are more than three babies in the nursery we will need additional help from a member volunteer, so we will continue to seek volunteers for each Sun. This person will change each week, but the nursery attendant will provide a much more stable environment for these smallest members of our church.
- ◆ The nursery attendant is expected to be present from 9 – 12 each Sun. and they should notify pastor as soon as possible if they will be absent. We expect this person to be present at least 48 Sundays a year. If they miss 3 weeks in a row,

we expect a doctor's excuse. After the first no call-no show, they will no longer be employed by the church.

- ◆ The church council will do the final hiring after recommendation by the Christian Education Committee, and the attendant will report to Pastor as her supervisor.
- ◆ A background check will be run on the person employed as required by the synod.
- ◆ Any applicants should be 21 years of age, have current infant and child CPR certification, and provide 3 three work references. We will not expect the person hired to bring any children with her to be supervised while they are working.
- ◆ The pay will be \$10.00 per hour, \$30.00 per Sunday morning.

- ◆ The attendant is responsible for setting up and putting away any thing used in the care of the children. Parents are to provide her with any clothing changes or snacks they feel their child might need while in the care of the attendant.

The committee will be placing ads in the IUS job marketer, the local newspapers, Ivy Tech, and Ottawa university job listings. If you know anyone who fits these guidelines and is interested in the job, please contact Faith Lutheran Church at 282-6993.

During the season of Lent the following educational opportunities will be available. Sunday Church School for children ages 3yrs. to adult each Sunday at 9:15. Wednesday night there will be a study of the following Sunday's Bible lessons that will be led by Pastor for the adults and Senior high teens.

If you know a person to recommend to staff the nursery from 9-12 Sunday mornings, please give their name to or have them contact Pastor, Carol Taylor, or Arlys Johnson.

This paid position will require a background check. The Christian Education committee will interview and screen the individual and recommend them to council.
