This month I want to share again some information I have received from Alban Institute just recently. This article will be centered on humility as a quality of leadership.

Humble Leadership by N. Graham Standish

Traditionally, humility is understood as a virtue. And humility is a Christian virtue because, like all other virtues, the practice of humility opens us to Christ's presence; or more specifically, it enables us to pay attention to Christ's presence and guidance. Humility orients us more toward the spiritual so that we can live a life of Spirit. Another way to understand humility is to view it as a state of being in which we become radically open to God throughout our lives. Humility is a way of life in which we become consumed with seeking God's direction rather than living purely according to our instincts, conditioning, and insights. For the Christian, humility integrates our spiritual and human natures in a way that allows us to become united with Christ.

So what is the nature of humble leadership? It is leadership that is radically open to God--in which we lead from faith rather than fear, from a willingness to let God's will flow through us rather than willfully insisting that our own will be done, from hope rather than cynicism, from love rather than selfishness, and from God's power rather than our own power. When we lead with an openness to God, we allow God's power and grace to flow through us. We make prayer and discernment a foundation of our leadership, always seeking first what God wants and then leading others in that direction by inviting them to the same kind of humble prayer and discernment.

This is not an easy path, because it feels ambiguous and uncertain. There are no guarantees when we choose to lead with openness. Why? Because its leadership that arises from discerning God's path, and discernment is never easy. When we are open to God, we run the risk of traveling through deserts and valleys of shadows. The vision may not be clear, and not everyone will follow us. When we close ourselves off to God and follow tried-and-true paths, vision and programs seem much clearer and easier because we follow where others have already trod. Becoming open to God and leading with openness can be troubling. What if we follow in this direction and we don't get great results right away? What if we trust God and good things don't happen? What if we lead people in a direction we believe to be God-inspired, and they won't follow?

This kind of leadership is scary and anxiety-producing because it has a real potential for failure. Why? Because this way of leadership depends upon seeking God's path--a path that may not be completely clear to us--and not upon following the safe paths of human convention. For example, as pastor of Calvin Presbyterian Church, I've been trying my best to lead us in God's direction by encouraging other lay leaders to make discernment of God's will a passion. In a practical sense, this approach sometimes means that I don't exactly know where we are going, but I try to keep people calm, faithful, and ready for opportunities that God presents to us. I've learned that becoming open to God means following wherever God leads even if the way is obscured, for as the Bible shows, God often calls leaders to lead people to promised lands that can't be seen until the very end.

gift is too small to be noticed. There is an story about an old man on the beach at low tide returning stranded starfish to the sea. Someone asked him if it really made a difference. His response was it made a difference to those he was able to save. He made a difference and you can too.

If we all make a commitment to step out of our deep-set traditions and find new ways to support our church, reach out to those around us and expand our programs within the community, God will bless our congregation with continued growth and riches untold.

After a lovely winter in Florida, Jim and I are happy to be back with our Faith family, especially our Owl buddies! Virginia has done an excellent job of writing newsletter articles and I thought the position had been successfully transferred to her shoulders, but, alas, she is out of town. So here goes!

A series of unfortunate and fortunate events, some small miracles, and much dedicated effort - here lies the story of Faith's "new" stained glass window hangings.

This story began about twenty years ago, when Dena and Robert Leslie, members of Incarnation Lutheran Church, dedicated themselves to the creation of these beautiful window hangings as a gift to their church. The congregation loved the windows! They hung in the church for a number of years. Sadly, Incarnation Lutheran Church closed its doors about ten years ago.

Last spring our OWLS took a field trip to St. Meinrad Archabbey. There we enjoyed a tour of the magnificent church and its grounds, were inspired by a Vespers service, and ate our dinner in the residence hall. We talked there about the beauty of the church. Fred Steaban was particularly moved by the stained glass windows, and others of us agreed that they were, indeed, inspiring.

Jim and I went to the Chataqua at the Howard Steamboat Museum shortly afterward, saw some lovely stained-glass window hangings and thought the OWLS might be interested in purchasing some hangings for our church. The OWLS agreed to become involved with this project, and several members formed a committee.

Time went by, we looked, but nothing had come of our efforts.

Then our dear Betty Condra called Karen Vescelus and asked Karen if she knew of stained glass dealers or where we might find stained glass hangings. Karen, a former member of Incarnation, told Betty about Incarnation's windows, but she did not know what had happened to them. Betty contacted the Synod and learned that the windows were in the possession of the Synod and were stored at First Lutheran Church in Louisville. So Betty wrote to the Bishop requesting that, as several of our members had come from Incarnation, Faith Lutheran might have access to the windows.

Several of us OWLS went to First Lutheran last fall, viewed the window hangings, and were allowed to bring them back to the church with us.

Now the beginning of OUR story. Elaine Thoms, who is a quite-gifted "amateur" stained glass artist, agreed to refurbish the windows for us. Some of them had minor problems, and others more significant flaws. All fall Elaine worked on the windows. Mike Baugh and Mike Vescelus made new frames.

Early in April several of the OWLS had a putty party and reputted all the windows. The following Saturday the windows were cleaned, polished, and hung in our church.

On Easter Sunday Pastor John dedicated the windows!

And that is the end of the story and the beginning of the story. We hope these beautiful window-hangings will inspire us in Faith for many years! Thanks to everyone for all their help in this project! And thanks to God for making all of this possible.

Later this spring the OWLS are going, once more, to entertain the people of the Ken Ellis Center with a party. More details later!

WEEKDAY CHURCH SCHOOL

May is the last month of school year 2006/07. Thursday, May 17th will be the last day of school. This day will be our annual bus trip to the Conner dairy farm in Shelbyville, Ky. Children, siblings, parents, and grandparents from all three classes will travel by Miller Co. school buses to the farm to see the Conners milk their cows, go for a hay ride, help make homemade ice cream, and have it for dessert at their picnic lunch. The buses will leave the church parking lot at 9:25 am and return to the church by 2:00 pm. Everyone should come to school by 9:15 on this morning. The Conners own a private dairy farm and have opened their home to Faith Weekday for the past 25 years. They have been doing this in the interest of letting the children witness what life on a farm is like and to let them see first hand that the milk that they buy in a store comes from the cows on their farm. We want to thank them from the bottom of our hearts for this great way to end our school year. This trip got started many years ago when Mrs. Conner's mother was a part of the Weekday staff before her death. Thanks Linda and Vince for continuing this tradition.

All of the classes are full for next year. The seven people on the pre-K waiting list will have to wait until at least mid July to know

if they will have a spot in that class next year. This wait is because I know several parents have applied for their child to go to the Head Start program that meets 4 days a week and is sponsored by the government and Clark County Schools. They do not finalize their class lists until just a couple of weeks before school begins for the new year in August. This means we could lose several children who are now enrolled in our program, but who would transfer to head start if they are accepted by that program. If any transfer, then the waiting list will be called and taken into the class by the order they were put on the list. All I can say is "patience please," because it is out of our hands at this time.

The first year students will be finishing their unit on families, then talk about God's plan for spring. The last week they will be discussing what they will see at the dairy farm. The Pre -K class will be talking about spring and God's plan for seeds, and baby animals. They will dissect a lima bean to find the baby plant God hid inside. They will learn that seeds need soil, water, and sunshine to grow. They will also learn that God gives the seeds everything they need to grow, make food for us to eat, and make more seeds for next year. What a wonderful God we have!!!

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Christian Education team met on Monday, April 9th and discussed the following items. We proposed that the last day of Sunday school will be May 20th.

Augsburg Fortress has created a new Sunday school material that we can use to replace Life Together, the material we now use for children's church, and that will no longer be published by Augsburg. It will follow the church readings and will be good to use as a curricula for children's church. The children seem to be getting a better handle on the Old Testament history since we have been using Witness 2 as the curriculum in Sunday School each week. We discussed at length what we should do about children's Church during Church service? Should we continue as it has been involving children 3yr. to kindergarten, or should we offer two age level classes? (one for ages 3-k and one for 1st grade -4th grade), or drop the whole children's church program. Shelly Mitchell does not want to continue teaching this class because for two years she has not been able to attend the full church service. We accepted her resignation with much thanks for her service. We decided to try to get two people to take the children in the two different classes. The thinking was that while the perfect situation is that all the children are in church with their parents after they have at-

tended Sunday school at 9:15, this is not what is happening at Faith. So it is better that they leave after the children's sermon to learn at their individual age level, than to never get any instruction or social interaction at their age level. Donna Baugh has also resigned from the 3yr-kindergarten class for next fall. We also wish to thank her for preparing each and every Sunday. She also wants to return to the adult study class. So WE ARE LOOKING FOR 3 TEACHERS TO TEACH THE LITTLE ONES. Two of these during the sermon and one during the Sunday school hour .
